Dear Sir:

I write in objection to the USDA Forest Service and concurrent National Park Service Mountain Goat Management Draft Environmental Impact Statements Record of Decision signed June 18 2018.

This objection letter is specific to prior comments requesting the forest service forbid/cancel helicopter landings in three wilderness areas within the Olympic National Park/National Forest, MT. Baker-Snoqualmie and Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forests. Ding so would be a purposeful violation of the Wilderness Act of 1964 in violation of established statue law.

Find a natural way to expel mountain goats from wilderness areas within the confines of the law.

Consider a biotic cure such as gray wolf and mountain lion reappearing in a contiguous national forest. These may wander into a nearby wilderness where prey species evidently abound.

Otherwise let the mountain goats be in wilderness. Leave wilderness completely unmanipulated in any way whatsoever. Let nature itself solve troubling issue free of meddling.

A suggestion: The secretive USDA wildlife killing program often eliminates every predator they can find for private ranchers. Goats have no predators? Look closely at Wildlife Services first.

I have sign this objection letter. This objection letter is specific to stopping/canceling illegal helicopter landings in wilderness. Helicopters and airplanes must maintain a minimum of 2,600 feet about ground level when flying over wilderness

Hopefully no longer at issue is planned lockdowns at helicopter landing areas. My experience with forest service timber sale administrators at a lock down forest road barricade with a badge and a hand on the butt of his pistol telling me he would harm me to prevent my being harmed. It was bullying. He had accepted a quart of whisky from the logging company boss to look the other way while they took large unmarked trees.

I learned the law and a million spent preparing an EIS meant absolutely nothing. I worry your possible lock down could means exactly the same as above.

Outrageous illegal rule bending can occur on the Olympic, MT. Baker-Snoqualmie and Okanogan-Wenatchee as well. It can happen very easily. Can you guarantee it will not?

It is easy for me to envision motorized vehicles in wilderness moving dead and tranquilized goats during a convenient, heavily guarded lock down.

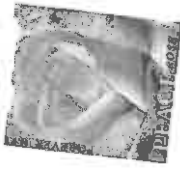
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
