**SUBJECT:** 36 CFR 218 Objection Pacific Connector Pipeline **Site Specific Plan Amendments** for the Umpqua, Rogue River-Siskiyou, and Fremont-Winema National Forests

Dear Forest Service:

In accordance with 36 C.F.R. Part 218, I, Millicent Anderson, hereby object to the project described below.

**DOCUMENT TITLE:** Opportunity to Object, Plan Amendments for Pacific Connector Gas Pipeline on the Umpqua, Rogue River-Siskiyou, and Fremont-Winema National Forests.

**PROJECT DESCRIPTION:** The Forest Service proposes to approve 30.6 miles of the Pacific Connector Pipeline route across the National Forest System. This proposal includes approximately 591 acres of forests for the construction of the Pipeline Project and an additional 186 acres of permanent right of way. This decision would allow crossing of 10.8 miles on the Umpqua National Forest in Douglas County, 13.7 miles on the Rogue River Siskiyou National Forest in Jackson County, and 6 miles on the Fremont-Winema National Forest in Klamath County.

**PROJECT LOCATION (Forest/District):** Umpqua, Rogue River-Siskiyou, and Fremont-Winema National Forests, Douglas, Jackson, and Klamath Counties, Oregon.

**NAME AND TITLE OF RESPONSIBLE OFFICIAL:** Alice B. Carlton, Forest Supervisor and Responsible Official, Umpqua National Forest

**TIMELINESS:** This objection is timely filed. Notice of Opportunity to Objection To "Site Specific" Plan Amendments for Pacific Connector Gas Pipeline proposed decision was published in the Federal Register on November 22, 2019. Forty-five days from November 22, 2019 is January 5, 2020.

**OBJECTION:** We are aware that one of the necessary approvals for the Jordan Cove LNG Pipeline is to exempt the project from Forest Service land use plans for the sections of the pipeline crossing National Forests. Forest removal and pipeline construction violate so many provisions of the Forest Service's management plan and we strongly object to the Forest Service's plan to amend their land management plan to allow this project to go forward. My husband and I live in Oregon because we love this state's beautiful rivers and lakes, its mountains and forests. We value and use the forests and watersheds that the Forest Service manages on behalf of the public. Throughout the extensive FERC planning process, I, like many others, have voiced my concerns over the impacts of pipeline construction on public and private lands. This plan will put an ugly scar on our beautiful landscape and there are absolutely no benefits to any of us who live here. When Pembina is done and gone, we are the ones who will suffer the impact for years and years to come. The Jordan Cove LNG Export Pipeline is a disastrous project with long-term environmental implications; earthquakes happen, gas pipes leak and break and explode causing wildfires, water gets contaminated, wildlife and peoples lives are at risk. I, Millicent Anderson respectfully request that the Forest Service withdraw the recommended project and DENY this project.
