Thank you for the opportunity to comment on Midas Gold Idaho's Plan of Restoration and Operations.

Over the last several years, I've had the opportunity to hear a handful of presentations on the Stibnite Gold Project, sit down with project staff and observe how the company has lived out its mission as it has grown. It is with this knowledge that I encourage you to permit the Stibnite Gold Project.

The company gives its time, talent and resources to support local charities and environmental causes. They have made it clear reclamation efforts will start alongside operations. For example, before mining ever begins, fish will be reconnected to their native spawning groups upstream through a fish passageway.
