In my opinion, Midas Gold has gone through the due diligence and then some to prove they are capable of both developing the Stibnite-Yellow Pine mining site and restoring the surrounding environment. I would like to see the U.S. Forest Service adopt Alternative 2 of their proposal and allow this project to move forward.

After gaining a reputation for the environmental problems that have been around for decades, the Stibnite-Yellow Pine region is in desperate need of revitalization. More than anyone, I was doubtful about letting another mining company in to the area, but actions speak louder than words and Midas Gold has taken every action possible to not only involve the local communities that will be most impacted by this project, but to update their plans for restoration to reflect the input and feedback community members provided.
