

## Standardized Reclamation Cost Estimator

This website hosts the **Standardized Reclamation Cost Estimator** (SRCE) software that was originally developed as a cooperative effort between the Nevada Division of Environmental Protection, Bureau of Mining Regulation and Reclamation (**NDEP**), the U.S. Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management (**BLM**) and the Nevada Mining Association (**NvMA**). The focus of that effort was to facilitate accuracy, completeness and consistency in the calculation of costs for mine site closure and reclamation.

The project was implemented largely on a voluntary basis with initial funding provided the NvMA. The SRCE software continues to be developed and supported on a voluntary basis, and the model is publicly available free of charge. For more information on the project please see the About SRCE page.
