Jason Maxedon and TWRA have finally begun a similar attitude at local WMA Ernest Rice which is decades overdue. The forest floor had been bare for a while. Hunters should not be able to see 200 yards through the timber and if they can that is an unhealthy forest and needs to be reset. I am glad they are logging because it was overdue. With that, I know the same will happen in the Pond Mountain Project, however there needs to be oversight to ensure the "habitat improvements" are not taken too far and decisions are made based on habitat improvement vs the potential bottom line in a profit and loss statement. I say that because during my initial research on the project I found the description that follows: "Fuel treatments (non-activity fuels); Forest vegetation improvements; Species habitat improvements" In my opinion, these are too vague. The public needs transparency and these descriptors can be subjective and do not offer much transparency on what they specifically mean.
