For nearly two decades ranchers, environmentalists, hunters and anglers, recreationists, and businesses have come together to design the boundaries and stipulations surrounding this mineral withdrawal, even supporting a permanent withdrawal as part of the CORE Act. While we wait for Congress to finalize passage of the CORE Act and protect this jewel permanently, it's imperative that the Thompson Divide receives protection from you, the managing agencies, via this common sense proposal.
