I am a life long SE Arizona outdoorsman. As an Arizona native, I've lived long enough to have witnessed the dramatic changes in our sky islands, from the hopeful slow healing of lumbered and mined forests recovering from over exploitation of the 1800's to the recent disappointment of over recreated times since COVID. Thousands of new "unofficial" roads are being blazed from the exploding ORV fad and thousands of new camping sites are being cleared with the trash, target shooting remnants, trampled plants, toilet paper and everything associated with unregulated public use and access. With limited resources, little to no law enforcement is available to land managers creating a perfect storm of destruction to our sensitive forests.

Installing new roads is not a way to elevate the problems unless you can provide funding for the law enforcement necessary to manage the new access areas and It is clear that's not happening anywhere on the Coronado.
