250 people have signed a petition on Action Network telling you to Scoping comments to protect the Patagonia Mountains from inappropriate fast-tracking.

Here is the petition they signed:

Pursuant to the Forest Service's scoping letter of May 10, 2024, please accept these comments with hundreds of names from across the United States to the Coronado National Forest regarding permitting of South32's Hermosa project in the Patagonia Mountains. As you know, the area is a global biodiversity hotspot in the "Sky Islands" region on the border with Mexico. This project is the first hardrock mine subject to the federal Fast-41 program, which aims to speed up permitting for certain energy projects, and as such should be the model for rigorous protection for our communities and the environment and not to rubber stamp a poorly designed mine project.

It is essential that irreplaceable landscapes such as the Patagonia Mountains not be sacrificed on the altar of climate change. That's why I urge you to give the following points I raise about this project especially careful review:

- 1) Biodiversity — The Patagonia Mountains and area around the town of Patagonia are home to more than 100 imperiled species of plants and animals. It's the duty of federal agencies to prevent their extinction. Biodiversity is also essential to the region's nature-based restorative economy, which attracts outdoor enthusiasts for hiking, cycling, and wildlife viewing.
- 2) Water — As in many parts of the arid West, threatened wildlife in the Patagonia Mountains rely on groundwater to survive. Dewatering for mining could be devastating, destroying local springs and streams that wildlife rely on and many sensitive species live in. The project would discharge 6.84 million gallons of water per day into Harshaw Creek as part of its dewatering operations. And the plan would disrupt a sensitive ecosystem both as species adjust to increased flows, then again after closure when these increased flows cease.
- 3) Cumulative Impacts — The Forest Service is required to analyze the total impacts of all reasonably foreseeable actions as they relate to this project. Currently, the lack of adequate cumulative impact analysis in a recent environmental assessment for the Barksdale Resources Sunnyside project is being considered by U.S. courts. The Sunnyside project is less than a mile from the project boundary.
- 4) Recreation Economy — The town of Patagonia benefits from a vibrant eco-tourism industry that's dependent on a healthy ecosystem. Increased truck traffic, noise, light pollution, land degradation, and harms to flora and fauna all threaten to undermine this sustainable economy and must be taken into account.
- 5) Due Diligence — South32's Hermosa project is the only hardrock mine listed under Fast-41. However, that nomination is not approval, and the listing was made in advance of the now required environmental review. To meet expected standards, the Forest Service should follow the UN Guiding Principles on due diligence.

Thank you for your careful consideration of these comments and all that's at stake with this

proposal. I care deeply about this part of the Sky Islands and urge you to do everything in your power to see that it remains protected.
