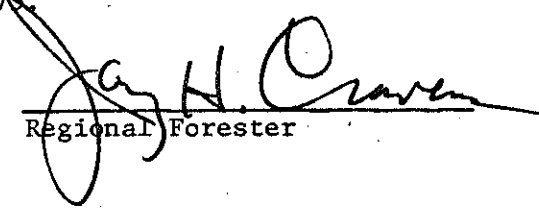

DESCRIPTION OF BOUNDARY

PRESIDENTIAL RANGE-DRY RIVER EASTERN WILDERNESS

A tract of land in the White Mountain National Forest located in the unincorporated towns of Beans Grant, Chandlers Purchase, Crawfords Purchase, Cutts Grant, Hadleys Purchase, and Sargents Purchase, County of Coos, and the incorporated town of Harts Location and the town of Jackson, County of Carroll, State of New Hampshire.

All distances are map distances (planimetric quadrangle maps scaled 1:31680) and, therefore, are only approximate.

BEGINNING AT POINT 1, which is corner 10 of the United States Tract 619 (Notchland Corporation), which is a point on the Carroll (Harts Location) - Coos (Hadleys Purchase) County line (town line), which is also a point in the White Mountain National Forest Proclamation Boundary; thence, northwesterly 2.4 miles with said Proclamation Boundary to a point 300 feet southeast of the centerline of the existing Appalachian National Scenic Trail (Webster Cliff Trail No. 95), POINT 2; thence, northerly 3.8 miles parallel with and 300 feet south and east of said Appalachian Trail (Webster Cliff Trail No. 95) to a point of intersection with the Mizpah Spring Hut Special Use Permit boundary as shown on site plan approved April 15, 1975, POINT 3; thence easterly, northerly and westerly with said Special Use Permit boundary to a point 300 feet easterly of the centerline of the existing Appalachian National Scenic Trail (No. 95) POINT 4; thence northeasterly 0.6 miles parallel with and 300 feet southeast of said Appalachian Trail (No. 95) to a point 300 feet south of the centerline of the existing Appalachian Trail (Crawford Path Trail No. 76) POINT 5; thence northeasterly 3.5 miles parallel with and 300 feet southeast of said Appalachian Trail (No. 76) to a point 200 feet south of the centerline of the existing Camel Trail (No. 77) POINT 6; thence easterly 0.7 mile parallel with and 200 feet south of said Camel Trail (No. 77) to a point 200 feet southwest of the centerline of the existing Davis Path Trail (No. 70) POINT 7; thence southerly 1.1 miles parallel with and 200 feet southwest of said Davis Path Trail (No. 70) to a point 200 feet southwest of the centerline of the existing Glen Boulder Trail (No. 82) POINT 8; thence southeasterly 0.5 mile parallel with and 200 feet south of said Glen Boulder Trail (No. 82) to Gulf Peak (Slide Peak) elevation 4807 feet POINT 9; thence, south-southeasterly 1.6 miles with the height of land to elevation 3929, POINT 10; thence, south-southeasterly 0.8 mile with the height of land to elevation 3660, POINT 11;

thence, south-southwesterly 1.2 miles with the height of land to elevation 3240, POINT 12; thence, south-southeasterly 2.2 miles with the height of land to Maple Mountain elevation 2626, POINT 13; thence, due west 0.8 mile to the Coos (Sargents Purchase) Carroll (Jackson) County line (town line) POINT 14; thence, south-southeasterly 2.0 miles with said county line (town line) to the southwest corner of the town of Jackson, POINT 15; thence, due west 1.1 miles to a point 200 feet east of the centerline of the existing Davis Path Trail (No. 70) POINT 16; thence, southwesterly 1.8 miles parallel with and 200 feet east of said Davis Path Trail (No. 70) to the point of intersection with line corner 5-6 of said United States tract 619, POINT 17; thence, northerly 0.6 mile with said Tract 619 to a point of intersection with the east bank of the Saco River, POINT 18; thence, northerly 1.4 miles with the said east bank of the Saco River to a point of intersection with line corners 9-10 of said Tract 619, POINT 19; which is a point in the White Mountain National Forest Proclamation Boundary; thence, east-northeasterly 0.6 mile with said Tract 619 and said Proclamation Boundary to the POINT OF BEGINNING containing approximately 20,000 acres.
