- 1. To complete your quote from the Wilderness Act please remember the following which you omitted: "subject to such reasonable regulations as are deemed necessary by the Secretary of Agriculture"
- 2. This trail, were it was not obliterated by the cows, has Elephant Head growing along its border. I have only been a resident of Colorado and a regular visitor to Colorado's Wilderness areas in all season's of the year since 1974 but in all that time I have never known that plant to grow anywhere but in a wet and marshy area. I certainly think it would be "reasonable" to not allow grazing in a naturally wet area like this one.
- 3. I spent a lot of time in the saddle during fall round ups on BLM land when in my 20's near Ignacio. My father-inlaw was born and raised on a ranch near Trapper's Lake in the Flat Tops Wilderness. My wife and I and later our children spent a long week every summer for over 30 years on a ranch horseback riding, hiking and fishing near Trapper's Lake. The ranchers I know are responsible people.
- 4. I would like to see a copy of the lease you are referring to in this particular instance.
- 5. We were hiking on the Stealey Mountain Trail only a few miles away from the trashed trail which seemed like a reasonable area for grazing, but did not see any cows.
- 6. In the past when I leased property I had to provide a damage deposit and was responsible for damage in excess of that amount if it occurred. Do the people that lease this land provide a damage deposit or a bond? and if so how much? Does it cover the cost of destruction and reclamation of the trail?
- 7. You may want to remove the sign at the beginning of the trail that states "Keep Wilderness Wild," as the current conditions with cattle grazing are not keeping wilderness wild.
