The thought of losing land to use for recreating for myself, my friends, and other fellow Alaskans is an awful thought. I am completely against the loss of any snowmobiling areas in the CNF and I respectfully ask that you consider adding more land to the revision plan that would open up more areas to motorized use (Revision plan B).

Over the years it is increasing noticeable that more people are using snowmobiles to access areas within the Chugach National Forest, for strictly snowmobiling, as well as skiing and snowboarding, and although that is great it also poses a safety risk to everyone with areas being sometimes over crowded. Additionally, it is a shame that we have all of this beautiful country that is ours, but we are not able to use it and access it. The first counter argument to that is that snowmobiles create a lot of pollution and that they damage the land, tear up the ground, and that they are bad for the environment in every way shape and form stated by those who don't ride snowmobiles.
