Is it really necessary to have heterogeneity in spruce dominated areas? A spruce stand seems to be a welcome sight in the midst of a forest dominated by pine trees. Hiking through the forest, it is always pleasant to come upon a spruce stand, usually a cool, moist area.

Perhaps creating openings in the stands of over-mature trees is needed to foster growth of spruce in the long term and keep down the fuel loads and ladder fuels.
