Dear Supervisor Benson,

Thank you for providing the opportunity to comment on the Kootenai winter travel plan scoping documents. I appreciate that the public was provided the opportunity to see the minimization criteria at this early phase. I also commend the Forest Service for not allowing snowmobiling in wild places like recommended Wilderness and research natural areas.

There are places on the forest where this process can seek to increase winter motorized opportunities, such as Twenty Odd Peak, Drift Peak, a portion of Dry Creek, the east side of Gold Hill inventoried road less area (IRA), Big Creek IRA the east side of Robinson Mountain IRA, and the center portion of the Northwest Peaks IRA.

And, there are some areas that should not be opened to snowmobile use due to the important wildlife habitat and connectivity they provide. This includes large portions of the Galena, Barren, and Allen Peak IRAs south of the Cabinet Wilderness, as well as the west side of the Zulu IRA, most of the Mount Henry IRA with the exception of the area around Boulder Lakes, the

west side of Robinson Mountain IRA, the east section of Saddle Mountain IRA, and portions of Buckhorn Ridge and the Northwest Peaks IRAs.

This combination of management areas would support a wide range of both motorized and non-motorized winter recreation opportunities and the winter outdoor recreation economy that our communities benefit from, while also protecting wildlife populations. Here are the ways in which I participate in winter recreation on the Kootenai National Forest and areas where I have taken note that winter management could be improved or conflicts could be reduced:

I enjoy snowshoeing and x country skiing. I try and stay away from areas where animals may be denning.

I would like to see minimal winter machine travel especially in denning arweas, and winter animal migratory paths.
