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Comments: I disagree with the labeling of fixed anchors as "installations". Other human modification to the outdoor environment that I don't consider installations include: tent spikes, cairns, footprints, ammo boxes / summit registers, rappel webbing, cat holes dug to poop in, rocks stacked for bivvy wind breaks, summit placards.

It's obvious that the targeting of rock climbing anchors is opportunistic because rock climbers are a cooperative and cohesive user group compared to the rest of the unruly masses who constantly push the limits.

Attached is a photo of Borah Peak, in Challis National Forest, where no technical rock climbing is done. On the hike up to the summit we encountered fixed ropes, an installed flag, a summit plaque, and a register ammo box. It is obvious to me that these sort of gray-area tacitly allowed objects will continue in non-climbing areas. Targeting climbing anchors is unfairly picking on a single user group.
