Thank you for the opportunity to provide comments on the Notice of Intent ("NOi") for thepreparation of and Environmental Impact Statement ("EIS") regarding Land Management PlanDirection for Old-Growth Forest Conditions Across the National Forest System as noticed in Vol.88, No. 243 of the Federal Register on Wednesday, December 20, 2023. Mesa County values our collaborative partnership with the dedicated staff of the US Forest Service ("USFS") in themanagement of the Grand Mesa, Uncompangre, and Gunnison National Forests, as well as the Manti-La Sal National Forests. As mentioned in our comment letter for the Climate Resilience Advance Notice of ProposedRulemaking, Mesa County is comprised of more than 1.5 million acres of public lands, includingmore than 550,000 acres of national forests. Management and policy decisions made for federallands in Western Colorado exert a profound and direct influence on the well-being and interests of Mesa County and its residents. Mesa County has long advocated for the responsible and sustainable use of these public lands and resources. We acknowledge and emphasize the criticalrole of active forest management in sustained forest productivity, ecological resilience, as well associo-economic development, mental and physical well-being of our citizens, and continuedenjoyment for generations to come. We commend the NOi for recognizing the USFS's mandate to manage public forests for multipleuses and sustained yields, underscoring the pivotal role forests play in the social and economicfabric of adjacent communities. We urge the USFS to carefully consider the financial resources required for the implementation of these plan amendments. Prioritizing funding will be essentialto enable active management strategies, particularly in addressing the escalating risk of wildfires. We acknowledge the necessity of nationwide guidelines for managing old-growth forests. However, we firmly advocate that the most effective land management practices emerge from the direct involvement of those with a deep connection to the land. A hands-on approach fosters adetailed and holistic understanding of the unique requirements and objectives of our localcommunity, stakeholders, and government entities. This collaborative approach is critical indeveloping forest management strategies that cater specifically to the diverse environmental, social, and economic needs of Mesa County. We recommend that nation-wide management directives be coupled with localized, forest-specific flexibility, empowering land managers in eachforest to make informed decisions tailored to the specific circumstances of each location. Again Mesa County respectfully requests a thorough evaluation of the Mesa County ResourceManagement Plan to ensure alignment with any management prescriptions proposed within ourcounty. This review is crucial to maintain consistency and coherence in the management of ourresources within Mesa County. Also, Mesa County formally requests an opportunity to serve as aCooperating Agency in the development of the EIS. We look forward to continuing our engagement as this important undertaking proceeds.
