Comments: Indigenous peoples once practiced prescribed burning of forests and landscapes, but our technology and infrastructure has come a long way since first-nations people had the influence on the land that they once did. With climate catastrophe affecting the vast majority of the earth today, it is too late to pretend to appreciate indigenous people's knowledge of ecosystems, especially because native peoples have been murdered and indoctrinated and the bison had been massively slaughtered to the point of extinction.

With our synthetic products and recreational lifestyles, our technology is invading the wild spaces and quiet places. How can we pretend to be like the ancestors by treating the land with prescribed burns in the name of preventing massive-scale wildfires and climate catastrophe? Once all the ground cover is gone, plants and animals do not adapt, they disappear. There is no benefit for animals from a logged forest, and the wood harvested is used by people for profit and construction. We need our homes and structures to be well away from our forests, and protect the habitat that we still have; we shouldn't be building with wood, we should use brick and metal.
