Therefore I am NOT in favor of this project.

The past legacy of mining has created a disaster in The Black Hills named the Gilt Edge Superfund Site, where despite tens of millions of investment, long term remediation and mitigation on-site are not estimable.

The federal government and taxpayer will be paying for the fallout of this project (acid rock and heavy metal drainage), presumably, forever.

This legacy gives me pause and pits me against any future mining projects near our water source, Spearfish Creek, the value of which is also inestimable (water is priceless to the people who want to live, work, and thrive here long-term).
