This plant is known only from four populations on high-elevation vokanic ridges in Tuolumne County, It was first photographed by Larry Crawford, for whom the species is named, and then described as a new species in 2018 by Thomas Stoughton. It has been assigned a California Rane Plant Rank of 18.1. which means it is rare or endangered throughout its entire range.

THREATS

Climate change, timber activities, and random events that could eliminate its very small populations.
