I'm writing to strongly protest AGAINST a categorical exclusion for the Newark Exploratory Drilling Project.

It's "categorically" astonishing to me that we still have to fight these kinds of projects.

It's my understanding that this isn't really that small of a project, with plans to drill upwards of 400 holes.

Further, the drilling and potential gold-mining will be done above a municipal water source that provides Custer citizens, as well as tourists, with water. I know the Forest Service employs scientists and naturalists, so I'm not going to belabor the essential nature of clean, safe drinking water to people's health and happiness, but, sheesh, it feels like maybe someone should, given that this action is actually under serious consideration.
