I am a strong supporter of Wilderness protection and I think the rules for keeping it in a natural state are appropriate. I don't think those rules should be absolute. The equipment for the sensors should be placed with the least impact on the wilderness area and attempt to leave no trace.

When I elk hunt in the William O. Douglas Wilderness area, the jets from Whidbey Island fly low elevation training missions over the area and it doesn't seem to affect the wildlife. I believe the helicopters could drop equipment with minimal impact. I think the people that would install the equipment should follow the rules like everyone else and hike or horse pack into the area. If there is a will, there is a way to do the right thing.

We should have sensors on Glacier Peak and they can be placed with respect for the wilderness.
