I am a fan of both motorized and human powered recreation. In the winter, there are an endless number of mountains in the Girdwood area to ski. I ski right here in Girdwood, up in the Crow Pass area. I ski in many of the valleys between Girdwood and Portage and of course I ski in Turnagain.

However, with snowmachining, there is not seemingly endless amount of areas that allow access. I use snowmachining as transportation to get to otherwise very difficult and far zones in order to ski. I often snowmachine out of Whittier because that is the closest motorized zone to my house. Also, with every winter become warmer and warmer, Whittier is a really nice place to go because you gain a lot of elevation right out of the parking lot. I also do a lot of sledding in Turnagain, and though I love it and feel very lucky to have that area, it can often be crowded which can make for very unsafe situations. I think if any of the current motorized zones are designated Wilderness and taken away from the motorized users, the ones that remain open will become more crowded and dangerous. I also often snowmachine out of Lost Lake, Turn Lake and Snow River.
