We also enjoy boating throughout the state and specifically on the Kenai Peninsula and Prince William Sound. We are responsible outdoor enthusiasts and want to maintain our access as is! Please don't expand primitive or wilderness areas in Prince William Sound.

I support Alternative B with a few modifications:

- 1) There is a remote area northeast of Cordova that is used for snowmachining and heli-skiing. This area should remain open to winter motorized use.
- 2) In order to maintain access to the icefields above Blackstone glacier, there needs to be a small motorized corridor from Whittier. This is shown in Alternative C.
- 3) We frequently visit the Twentymile river. Please show the existing motorized corridor as brown on the map.
