Comments: I am writing to voice my support of continued management our amazing landscape and identify why this is important to me. First, I live to ski and am so thankful for all of the opportunities we have in this area. When the snow melts, I turn to hiking and biking to satisfy my mountain urges. I am worried that Recommended Wilderness Areas will take away many of the great trails I have come to love. Living in Bozeman, I frequently bike on trails in the Bridgers, but cherish the few weekends I get out for longer adventures, and none have provided experiences quite like the Lionhead area. It would be a real shame to lose mountain bike access to this area. There is a swell of mountain bike enthusiasm in southwest Montana right now, which has also created many new riders that are willing and able to help care for our lands. I truly believe that most mountain bikers will care for this land and give back in the way of trail maintenance and help keep the area clean. Many rides in the Lionhead area very physically demanding for a biker.
