I oppose exemption of The Tongass National Forest from the Roadless Rule. Opening the Tongass to road building would fragment "one of the world's largest unfragmented ecosystems" (Aton, 2019). What's more the Tongass "trees hold about 650 million tons of carbon, which roughly converts to half of U.S. carbon dioxide emissions in 2017" (Aton, 2019).

The Tongass is a sanctuary of wildlife and Old Growth forest. It already feels the effects of climate change elsewhere. Opening the Tongass to road building and logging would fragment and destroy it. The Trump Administration's argument that any impact from logging would be "temporary" is not supported by the IPCC report. Even the scientists cited in the administration's EIS disagree with the administration's EIS.
