Comments: Comments to oppose modification to the Roadless Rule

Dear U.S. Forest Service,

Opening roadless areas to more logging and roads will fragment the Tongass National Forest and eliminate more of the big old trees that these animals rely on. At a time when intact, ancient forests are strongholds of climate resilience, and the Tongass is one of world's largest, this is a time to preserve old-growth areas, not clear-cut them.

Yet, all of the action alternatives in the Draft Environmental Impact Statement allow more roadbuilding and logging across the Tongass National Forest. Logging roads and timber operations cost tens of millions of taxpayer dollars every year, with zero return on investment. Meanwhile, these destructive activities degrade the naturally sustainable wealth of salmon, wildlife watching, and tourism opportunities.

It is past time to stop opening more and more acres to the timber industry and instead bolster protections to the old-growth forests and wild areas on the Tongass. I urge you to select the "No Action" Alternative (Alternative 1) and allow the Roadless Rule to remain intact on the Tongass National Forest.
