I support the No-Action Alternative for the Draft Environmental Impact Statement on the proposed Alaska Roadless Rule, Alternative #1: We must keep the current Roadless Rule protections intact for the Tongass National Forest.

This forest is a major carbon sink containing some of the largest intact old-growth temperate rainforest in the world; it's essential in providing clean water for fish and wildlife habitat and for the economic and ecological health of Southeast Alaska.

I urge you to keep the federal Roadless Rule intact and current protections in place for national forests in Alaska.

I strongly object to all your plans to reduce and remove protections from our national forest[rsquo]s roadless areas. The Roadless Rule is one of the smartest and most popular land management policies the Federal Government has ever adopted: It preserves some of America[rsquo]s best fish and wildlife habitat, and saves untold millions of taxpayer dollars that might otherwise be spent to subsidize money-losing timber sales.
