Forest management in Alaska should have this as a priority as well and not the development of a timber industry that has no future and can barely support the independent native organizations that still rely on this as a economic resource. Instead, these organizations are looking to diversify their portfolio and trend away from logging and timber extraction and more towards the business of adding value to seafood resources, a valuable industry in Southeast Alaska that depends on the healthy riparian habitat.

I am in favor of Alternative 1; to take no action and leave Alaska under the 2001 Roadless Rule.
