Comments: I support Alternative 6, the full exemption. The Tongass should be managed as a multiple-use forest. Activities such as timber harvesting, mining, energy development, and recreational access are severely inhibited by the current roadless rule. Historical records show that salmon populations have doubled in the forest sing the mid fifties when logging started. Also wildlife have thrived in the new growth stands where logging has occurred. Most of the recreational activities occur where access has been created by logging roads. All these resource development and recreational activities can co-exist and thrive under a properly managed forest system. I've seen this co-existence of diverse groups occur successfully in other parts of the world, such as New Zealand.
