Recreation areas, trails, and unique areas like Jake and Bull, Stonewall Falls, and along the Chattooga River should receive special consideration in Foothills Landscape and include ongoing collaboration with the groups using these areas.

Once meeting per year that is up to the discretion of the District Ranger is not enough.

If the Forest Service does not plan to include the public in site-specific decisions before implementing, I would like the Forest Service to specifically identify and explicitly prohibit cutting, herbicide application, and road work close to trails in the Foothills Landscape.

I would like my experiences on the trails within Foothills and in the National Forest to reflect a sense of natural beauty. These values are why I choose to spend my time in the "Foothills Landscape."

I am concerned with the lack of information about cutting trees, reworking trails, and burning areas near many of my favorite trails and camping areas.

I am worried that when we are planning our trips in the forest, we will be unable to know if the area is in a project area.

I want to keep the long standing practice of being notified and given an opportunity to have a say in where management and disturbances occur.

My family would like to know because many of the activities planned in this project do not provide a pleasing environment for my family and I to enjoy.

In general, Forest Service projects seem to create a major impact upon an area, with long times to complete, re-grow, and often look worse than prior to the project commencement.
