This letter is in response to the Nez Perce-Clearwater National Forest Plan Revision Draft Environmental Impact Statement.

I am a cattle producer in North Central Idaho, and I own a small herd while managing a larger family cow/calf operation. Currently, I am the Treasurer of the Nez Perce County Cattle Producers and a member of both the Idaho Cattle Association and National Cattlemen's Beef Association.

Our operation has cattle that graze on public lands from June to October every year, and we have maintained the permit for twenty years. Our operation works closely with the Potlatch Ranger District office to manage our Round Meadow allotment permit annually. We also work with Potlatch Deltic Corporation, the state of Idaho, the US Forest Service and various privately deeded lands.

Utilizing cattle grazing improves vegetation and wildlife habitats and increases local use of forests through recreation and hunting. Cattle are an excellent resource for Idaho's forests, as they help in reducing fires and promoting new growth. However, our range area includes mature timber and dying trees that are in dire need of harvesting to maintain forest health and decrease wildfire danger. The Clearwater Timber Protective Association (CTPA) has done an incredible job preventing and managing fires. We hope the USFS will continue to partner with CTPA to maintain control the fires in the area.

I have many concerns about the DEIS, and I support comments submitted by the Idaho Cattle Association and the Idaho State Department of Agriculture. Specifically, I support on the ground decisions made at the local level regarding the use of public lands, as well as the flexibility to increase the number of AUMs available on an allotment based on forage growth.
