I'd like to see heavy thinning and patch cuts to allow remaining trees to grow bigger from less competition. It'd be good to see thick, dense second growth forests thinned to allow light for shrubs and to encourage huckleberries and forage and cover for deer and grouse. Thinning will help more trees add diameter and be healthier thereby sequestering more CO2 in wood. Although the climate change difference between management and nothing will be next to nothing in the big picture. There's been very little logging on the MBSNF since 1990. It's good to see the USFS propose some modest timber management. Any logging should help pay for road maintenance. Poor road access and maintenance is a bad problem on the MBSNF.
