The science is clear in that our plant and animal wildlife does not recover after activities like this, and the people who make their home in the Tongass have a duty to stand up and oppose this project for all those beings who do not have the same kind of agency. I hope the Forest Service will put more time and resources into a non-partisan evaluation of the impacts of a roadless rule rescinsion and come to understand how this is not an action that will benefit Alaskans now or in the future--protections for the Tongass are our best path forward as a collective so that we can make sure all its beauty and resources are preserved for our children and their children.
