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Title:

Comments: I am a regular user of our National Forest lands for recreation and peaceful relaxation. I adamantly oppose the Forest Service's proposed rule to open up our National Forest lands to e-bike use for the following reasons:

- E-bikes ARE motor vehicles and this is our forest, not a road. Mountain bikes (non-motorized) are already overrunning and damaging our forest lands.
- This proposed rule suggests likely environmental impacts that should be fully evaluated through an environmental impact statement (EIS) under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA).
- The proposed rule appears to set up conflicts with the Forest Service's Travel Management Rule (36 CFR 212 et seg).
- Because of their speed and quiet nature, e-bikes can travel much farther into the backcountry, and startle and disturb wildlife over far greater distances. E-bikes also conflict with other nonmotorized trail users like myself, including hikers, horseback riders, and bicyclists.
- Because there is almost no enforcement now for trespass, illegal off-trail riding, and illegal trail development by some bikers, e-bikes will increasingly trespass into Wilderness and other protected areas with no consequences. This illegal use will degrade the wild character of these lands and should not be encouraged as this rule will do.

For these reasons and more, the Forest Service should withdraw this proposal.
