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Comments: The Midas Stibnite Gold Project poses an unnecessary threat to the Salmon river drainage by way of water contamination, air quality contamination, and disruption to an undisturbed wilderness area (among many other things). The effect on groundwater was neglected in the study done by DEIS and the need to treat surface water to return it to its current state for the next 100 years is unrealistic. The DEIS failed to address a rise in stream temperature below that dam site, or due to climate change (of which the mine is a direct contributor), which could reach hazardous levels for fish habitats. Contamination by heavy metals associated with the mine are ignored by DEIS despite them being deposited into the river. The mine is a huge concern to ecosystem in the East Fork of the South Fork Salmon River area. The post-operational plan is lacking, with water treatment and containment of hazardous materials being at the top of the list. The mine proposal disrupts a lot for a rather unnecessary and non-critical mineral (gold) and the possibility (not a guarantee/unknown quantity) of antimony, a substance that can be obtained from other already active mine sites. This project does far more harm than good. I staunchly oppose this project.
