Comments: The Good Neighbor Authority has many benefits, one detriment is the lack of authority to construct new permanent road. When roads are identified through NEPA analysis as needed for long-term management, yet the implementing entity is not allowed to construct such facilities, management options are limited and money is wasted. Constructing a temporary road, in lieu of permanent road (contradictory to handbook direction), then decommissioning the same road that has been identified as needed for future management objectives seems like an shooting oneself in each foot, twice. This is a very large flaw in the fundamental ideals of shared stewardship and good neighbor authorities that puts additional burden on the Forest Service to expend funds to support shared stewardship and good neighbor authorities that could easily support the construction of needed long-term facilities through timber receipts.
