Comments: As an former wildland firefighter and Forester, I agree that the Forest Service and their many stakeholders are in a position to create a more resilient forest by logging, prescribed fire, restoration and reforestation efforts, road building/closures, pest management, and weed control etc, and overall landscape management. These efforts will no doubt be substantial to local mills and improve jobs in the local community, and above all, reduce the risks of catastrophic fires that may, in some cases, lead to erosion, loss of critical habitat, and loss of Forest products. The Forest Service has followed its mission of "Multiple Use" and it appears to be step forward but my take on projects of this scope is that one needs to look at the big picture. Does the Government have the infrastructure, training, and experienced staff to assist with inspections, monitoring efforts, long term planning, fiscal budgets to carry out the proposed projects. These are just some of the issues, along with Climate Change that will be the tipping point in our local Forests. The Southwest Colorado Cycling Association (SWCCA) have been working diligently on trails in the Boggy Draw area and also have a keen interest and concern about trails in the proposed project areas. Those concerns are evident in the comments submitted.
