After learning about the Environment Assessment of the North Fork Nooksack Vegetation Management Project, I feel strongly opposed to Alternative 1. It is an irresponsible and unacceptable choice since it implements clearcutting. I believe that clearcutting should not be a part of the Nooksack Vegetation Management Project.
