I know it would discourage me and my family. I can also tell you that it may also discourage homeowners from purchasing in the area, it did for me as I was considering purchasing a home near Heber.

There must be a better way to manage the size of the herd that doesn't include reducing the current size so drastically. There is no way that reducing the size of the herd to 50- 104 horses guarantees their survival. If you allow this, you may essentially be signing off on the end of this herd. Not to mention the idea of an annual reduction to the herd - Is the intention of this plan to continue stating that the size of the herd is just too large and continue removing them until they are all gone? These horses have plenty of land to roam and are for the most part a healthy herd. Please let nature do it's job.

While I can't agree with the removal I can understand the need for the herd to not continue growing at the rate it has been. I agree that a female contraceptive program much like they have with the lower salt river horses may be necessary as a way to control the size of the herd moving forwards.
