Comments: I am writing to Take a REAL stand for the Heber wild horses.

There is NO proof of overpopulation.

Therefore there is no reason for a cull.

And there is no reason for PZP, GonaCon or other birth control measures.

Unfortunately there are people who have no knowledge of the Heber wild horse herd that are pressing for the use of PZP. - Due to the magnitude of the management plan and significant impact on the environment an EIS is required, pursuant to NEPA (National Environmental Policy Act).
