I understand that the project proposed is very controversial. I'm very concerned that the effects on the human environment and forest resources have not been adequately analyzed. I understand that a condition-based approach must not be utilized in the analysis of this project and that site-specific information is essential and MUST be provided.

It's vital that a broad range of the best available science be incorporated in the planning and analysis of this project. That has not been done so far, and more importantly, there is science that does not support the Proposed Action and appears to have been largely ignored!

The public must be genuinely included in project planning.
