That does not in any way justify further vandalism. The short and sweet answer is: HANDS OFF our wilderness areas. We know that the land will recover, but at its own rate. If it is necessary at some point to deal with invasive exotics, that can be addressed. Cutting down the burned trees, without giving them time to regenerate (which some will do) or to fall and decay over time will only exacerbate the alteration of the landscape. Because it is wilderness, the first consideration must be for the wilderness, not for the perceived safety needs of those transient human visitors.
