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Comments: I oppose using chainsaws to clear trails in Wilderness. Visitors to Wilderness should be allowed to experience nature on its own terms, which includes risks that naturally exist. Falling trees are a natural hazard that anyone who enters a Wilderness must be willing to accept-these are not "managed" forests, gardens, or city parks.

Dead and dying trees should be left alone in Wilderness. They serve a purpose to wildlife and fertilizes the soil and other plants.

The Forest Service should use crosscut saws, not chainsaws, to clear trails of only the fallen trees that must be removed. We got on these trails for peace and quiet and not for loud noises and pollution from the chain saws. Chain saws also scare the animals, and the wilderness is their home.

Wilderness visitors should be allowed to experience nature on its own terms, including any risks that entails. The Forest Service could post warning signs at trailheads alerting visitors to the risk, and letting visitors decide whether they want to accept the risk or hike somewhere else. Dead trees should be allowed to fall naturally, with crosscut saws then used to clear trails of fallen trees that must be cleared. This presents an outstanding educational opportunity to inform visitors of the benefits of Wilderness, of allowing natural processes to run their course, and the value of maintaining traditional skills.
