Comments: I write to state that I oppose using chainsaws to clear trails in Wilderness.

R5 Post Disturbance Hazardous Tree Management Project for the Pacific Southwest Region (Region 5) project includes cutting, logging, and removing thousands of "hazard" trees (both living and dead trees that burned over past fire seasons) along roads, trails, and facilities in 10 National Forests. The FS doesn't mention Wilderness anywhere in the project's scoping letter, but the maps are unclear as to whether Wilderness is included.

Visitors to Wilderness should be allowed to experience nature on its own terms, which includes risks that naturally exist. Falling trees are a natural hazard that anyone who enters a Wilderness must be willing to accept-these are not "managed" forests, gardens, or city parks.

The Forest Service could post warning signs at trailheads alerting visitors to the risk, and letting visitors decide whether they want to accept the risk or hike somewhere else. Dead trees should be allowed to fall naturally, with crosscut saws then used to clear trails of fallen trees that must be cleared. This presents an outstanding educational opportunity to inform visitors of the benefits of Wilderness, of allowing natural processes to run their course, and the value of maintaining traditional skills.

Let's keep the WILD in WILDerness.
