Comments: I am an ecologist. I am opposed to many parts of the disturbance hazardous tree management plan. First, dead and dying trees should be left alone in Wilderness--they serve as important fertilizer for future trees and as food for millions of insects, fungi, etc. that help with proper forest ecosystem function. Removing them will leave the ecosystems more damaged than before, depauperate, and with disrupted ecosystem function.
