Comments: Topic: US Forestry Service plans for Lake Tarleton area

Lake Tarleton and its surrounding areas are classic examples of the beauty within New Hampshire's White Mountains. The lake itself has crystal clear water, is mostly undeveloped, and offers excellent kayaking, boating, fishing, and bird watching. The lake backdrop is the magnificent Mount Moosilauke, with miles of untouched forest in between.

The US Forestry Service is proposing a plan that includes logging, clear-cutting land around the lake, and applying herbicides to control invasive plants. The current plan is to perform these tasks just 100 feet from the shores of the lake.
