This project will need considerable supervision to ensure that the necessity of the tree removal is being considered using as you mentioned slope, terrain, striking distance and the leave of live trees. Please consider whether 200 feet is necessary in all areas and be mindful that trees should be felled according to standard and guidelines for LSRs, protected wildlife sties, riparian reserves and wilderness.

My understanding is that this project is not a salvage operation for economic gain.I'm willing to pay for the cost for hazard tree removal if it saves a life of an individual but not a tree.

The ecosystem of a forest thrives on fires. Snags and trees affected by forest fires bring in insects, birds and mammals that are adapted to fire and survive on fire.
