Holland lake is one of those beloved areas to me. The last time I was up there was towards the end of July. The parking lot at the falls trailhead was packed full. The side of the road was so crammed I could barely squeeze through to even see the trailhead. It's no secret that this place is important to many people, Montanans and visitors alike.

I am a public land owner. Allowing POWDR to expand the Holland Lake Lodge, ESPECIALLY without the necessary environmental impacts report, would be stealing from Montana residents who love to live and recreate in this beautiful area.

An area of concern for me is the proposed cutting of 200 trees to clear space for buildings. Now, 200 may seem like a small number in the grand scheme of a forest.
