That being said, this proposal does not increase public access. The proposal is trading man made barriers for natural barriers. The proposed new trail is in extremely technical terrain making it impassable for most users, and %100 impassable after a snowstorm. One may say, "a mountain goat would need a second wind to navigate that trail." The negative interaction between users will also increase on this trail by consolidating access in this manner.
