The U.S. Forest Service is proposing a huge 265,000-acre project in the Roosevelt National Forest that could change the forest forever with logging, thinning, and burning in four designated roadless areas. These public lands are home to at least two federally threatened species-Canada lynx and Preble's meadow jumping mouse. Elk, northern goshawk, and greenback cutthroat trout would also be impacted. Known as the Black Diamond Landscape Resiliency and Risk Reduction Project in the Canyon Lake Ranger District west of Fort Collins, Colorado, the project would use illegal, user-created roads to access and treat areas that should remain roadless.

Please fully evaluates the potential negative impacts of this project and be more transparent about the locations and time frames of specific treatments over this 20-year project. Please take additional steps to protect wildlife in roadless areas.

The future of this large project could change an area explored and loved by many-the Roosevelt National Forest in Colorado.

Please inform the public when and where specific actions would take place under the Black Diamond project.
